Bulletin Number 3 – Interagency co-operation

Working in co-operation with relevant stakeholders is a cornerstone approach of the School Completion Programme. In 2011/2012, all projects worked in co-operation with other educational, statutory, community and voluntary agencies in their locale¹. As Table 1 outlines, SCP projects cumulatively reported collaboration with a total of **1,237 local** agencies during the twelve-month period. This represents an average of ten agencies working in collaboration with each SCP project. As Table 1 indicates, SCP projects have been able to maintain consistent links with other agencies supporting young people over three reporting periods.

While projects work with agencies providing a local response to young people at risk of early school leaving and social exclusion, there is much commonality in the type of agencies that SCP projects collaborate with, including:

There is evidence from the data collected over the last number of years that projects have developed and maintained sustainable links and interagency working with relevant agencies and stakeholders. This approach is particularly appropriate at a time of reduced budgets for all agencies and good working relationships should be developed or enhanced in this regard.
