



3rd Parenting Conference 2018 #ParentingTogether

Tusla Child and Family Agency's Parenting Conference is back for the 3rd year running! Taking place in Dublin Castle on May 31st, the conference promises to be a day full of interesting conversations and fun activities. We are proud to present our keynote speakers, David Tobis PhD, previous director of the Child Welfare Fund and author of the acclaimed book From Pariahs to Partners: How Parents and Their Allies Changes New York City's Child Welfare System and Dr. Una Lynch, a leading academic and Public Health Nurse. With a focus on inter-generational parenting, and the role that grandparents and other family members can play in the raising of a child, we hope that attendees will leave the conference with a newfound feeling of unity between themselves and other parents as we aim to create a safe atmosphere to learn and grow together.

3rd Child and Youth Participation Conference 2018 #ExpressYourself

Also making a come-back this year was the 3rd Child and Youth Participation Conference, which took place April 26th in Athlone. The conference was a huge success and highlighted the importance of children's and young people's engagement with Tusla and its partner agencies' services. Young people Eric O'Connor and Rachel Foody acted as Master of Ceremonies on the day, performing their role with vigor and keeping the atmosphere buzzing.



We heard from a wide range of speakers, including our keynote speaker Jana Hainsworth, the Secretary General of Eurochild, our CEO Fred McBride and some extremely talented young people who discussed what it is like to participate in the development of Tusla services.



How is the Government doing in assisting parents and families to rear children?

Ireland ratified the United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child (UNCRC) in 1992. The UNCRC requires the Irish State to ensure that legislation, policy, services and practice comply with children's rights, which include the right to health, education, protection, and an adequate standard of living. Ireland is evaluated periodically by the UN on its compliance with the rights contained in the Convention.

The UN Committee on the Rights of the Child offers guidance to States on how to implement the UNCRC. It calls on States to assist parents and families in their child-rearing responsibilities in early childhood through parent education, home visitors, and health and education supports for new parents, prevention and early intervention approach and other initiatives. The Convention refers to the family as "the fundamental group of society and the natural environment for the growth and well-being of all its members and particularly children".

The Children's Rights Alliance, a membership-based organisation with over 100 members working together to make Ireland one of the best countries to be a child, annually evaluates the extent to which the Government of the day has delivered on its commitments to children contained in the Programme of Government in the 'Report Card' series. In Report Card 2018, the Government was awarded an overall 'C-' grade for living up to its promises to children, an increase on last year's 'D+' and a 'C' for their prevention and early intervention efforts for children.


Bully-Proof Kids By Stella O'Malley Gill Books

Dublin North East

The Parenting Community Initiative in the Louth/Meath area have welcomed new families to their community. The Initiative is a Parental Participation seed-funded project developed by Tusla Family Resource Centre in Navan, Co. Meath. The project's main aim is to link families with children under 5 who are new to the area into their local community by hosting workshops or outings based on feedback from parents. Dublin Mid Leinster

The Tullamore Community and Family Resource Centre in Co Offaly is a Parental Participation seed funding site. Before the initiative began, the parent and toddler group 'Little Twinkles' were meeting in an unsuitable room and this was affecting attendance. Although there was a newly built activity space in the centre, there was no funding to furnish it. Through the seed funding grant, the centre in consultation with the parents, were able to purchase the furniture and



equipment needed and now there is a play area for toddlers, sensory corner for children with special needs, and a tea/coffee area where parents can meet and chat. The refurbishment was parent led and as part of the project the parents commissioned a local artist to design a mural on the wall which symbolised all aspects of family and community associated with the resource centre. The launch of 'Little Twinkles' took place on Wednesday September 13th 2017. Since the completion of the activity room, 'Little Twinkles' have relocated and are up and running two mornings per week.

West

The Building A Happy Baby campaign has come to Galway thanks to the efforts of the Early-Years sub-group of the Galway CYPSC. The UNICEF-promoted campaign centres on four main messages:

- 1. New babies have a strong need to be close to their parents as this helps them to feel secure and loved, like they matter in the world.
- Holding babies when they cry helps them to grow into confident and trusting toddlers.
- **3.** Holding, smiling and talking to your baby releases a loving hormone in you and your baby. This makes you both feel calm and happier.
- 4. Keep your baby close to you so that you can learn how to meet their needs and read their signals for hunger or comfort."
